FIRE DEPARTMENT NEWS In 2010, seven new volunteer fire fighters joined the department and completed their training and are now full fledged fire fighters. This year, a further seven recruits are working to complete the training courses. The Department now boasts a near-full complement of volunteers! Members are still being sought for the East Firehall (any address east of Mt. Work Park on Munn Rd.). Further, officials welcome any and all interested persons to contact them regardless of where they might reside within the District.

If you are working to clean up excess fuel load in your yard (fallen branches, etc.) a reminder that annual burning restrictions come into effect in just one month (April 1) after which permits will be required for outdoor burning. Please note that a permit is required year round for hand piles larger than 1 metre by 1 metre or for machine-made piles. Contact the Fire Chief or Deputy Fire Chief to request a permit (contact information on page 4).

TOUR DE VICTORIA - (BICYCLE ROAD RACE) - UPDATE As reported in the January edition, the District has received traffic management plans for this event. At its February 21 regular meeting, Council reviewed the plans and approved use of the District roads (Munn, Millstream Lake North, and Ross Durrance Roads) between the hours of 8:30 and 10:30 a.m. on Saturday, May 28th 2011.

The traffic management plans, (not specific to District roads), allow some traffic flow during the race by limiting the route to one lane. Details will be made available throughout the region ahead of time.

WORK ON SUSTAINABILITY PLAN CONTINUES The Highlands Sustainability Strategy Advisory Committee (SSAC) has been very active in the past month by providing direction for a draft Integrated Community Sustainability Plan (ICSP). In the fall of 2010, nine strategy or 'theme' areas were defined. At the Sustainability Fair in November, members of the public were involved in creating Descriptions of Success for sustainability in 2030 in each area. The next step was to define which actions would take priority in working toward a more sustainable Highlands; actions will be reviewed annually. The 42 recommendations from the 2009 Sustainability Task Force were used as a starting point for defining actions. They were revised and narrowed down to a manageable list of actions that could move us in the right direction in a relatively short period of time. Our consultant, the Whistler Centre for Sustainability, developed a series of indicators to help measure our annual progress. The indicators are currently being reviewed by the SSAC. A draft ICSP will be ready for public comment soon at: highlands.ca/sustainability.

REZONING APPLICATION RZ-01-11 At its regular meeting, Monday, February 21 Council received a report from the District Planner regarding rezoning application RZ-01-11 (1784 Millstream Road/ Finlayson Arm Road). The application proposes to create nine additional lots from two existing parcels (11 residential lots in total) and offers land for park and trail access as amenities. Council recommended sending this application to its APC and Select Committees, and referred the proposal to various outside agencies for review and recommendations. Council further requested that staff provide a subsequent report in future.

Signs indicating that the properties are the subject of a rezoning application have been installed. Information regarding this rezoning application can be found on the district's website at: highlands.ca/planning. Click on *Current Rezoning/OCP Applications*; a table will open with links to detailed information.

HERITAGE TASK FORCE UPDATE Last summer, Highland's Council tasked us with our first step: "identify community heritage values and a heritage vision for the Highlands." After much community consultation, we presented our report to Council in January. The full report and synopsis can be viewed through the Highlands Heritage Task Force link at: highlands.ca.

Our second phase of work, which began in February, is to "recommend to Council property, buildings or other areas of the municipality to be included on a Community Heritage Register."

A Community Heritage Register formally lists places that reflect the heritage values of the community. By first identifying community values associated with significant events, eras and trends in the community, we now have a Highlands-specific tool to ensure thoughtful and informed identification of different heritage resources for inclusion in the register. Once adopted, the heritage register will facilitate integration of heritage considerations in community planning, provide formal recognition for historic properties, and enable monitoring of heritage resources.

It is important to note that inclusion in the heritage register is not the same as heritage designation. A Community Heritage Register provides formal recognition of heritage places and is adopted by Council, but does not automatically provide legal protection. Heritage designation is a more involved procedure that results in the continued protection of heritage property through site-specific bylaws and the use of permits to monitor change. However, it is possible through the process of developing a Community Heritage Register important heritage resources might be recommended for future heritage designation. When heritage resources occur on private land, consultation with owners is a critical part of both processes.

Using community knowledge, and documented sources such as "Beautiful Rocks - A History of the Highland District", we will identify ten or more places that represent the range of heritage values brought forward by the community through our public engagement process. Each item in the heritage register requires a formal written "Statement of Significance" which includes a detailed description, the identification of heritage values, and a list of character-defining elements of the heritage resource. After Council's approval, they will be listed on the BC Register of Historic Places.

2011-2015 FINANCIAL PLAN CONSULTATION The District has begun the budget process for this year. The Community Charter requires local governments to enact a five year financial plan (budget) and to consult on the budget with the community. The consultation can take different forms depending on the needs of the municipality.

Highlands holds a series of budget meetings at the scheduled Committee of the Whole sessions on the second Monday of each month. The process for this year began with an overview on February 14. You will find the presentation on our website by looking at the February 14 Committee of the Whole agenda. The next scheduled session is for Monday, March 14, 7:00 pm at the School House. These budget sessions provide a method by which to become familiar with the District's finances, but more importantly provide community members with an opportunity to provide input into the services and proposed projects that the District undertakes.

WATER ACT MODERNIZATION INPUT (B.C. GOV) Council, on recommendation from the Ground Water Task Force, has provided comments and questions to the province on the recently released Policy Proposal for the new Water Sustainability Act. Concerns were raised around four areas, the "first in time, first in right" system, the lower limits which would require the province and the delegation of outbority. It is based that if the province responds to Councille gives

monitoring, tradable permits, and the delegation of authority. It is hoped that if the province responds to Council's questions in time, there will be an opportunity to provide further comment before the March 14th deadline. Public input is also welcomed. HIGHLANDS HISTORY - DID YOU KNOW? The next time you go to the Highland Municipal Hall, as you pull into the parking lot, take a quick look up to your right. Part way up the bank there is a small opening surrounded by bricks. This is the remains of the only known limekiln found in the Highlands. Constructed sometime in the 1880s, it is evidence of Highland pioneer's attempts at joining in a thriving industry. Lime was an important ingredient in cement and plaster and was used for fertilizer. Caleb Pike and his son Charles put this ad in the Daily Colonist September 21, 1886.

"Millstream Lime Kiln, C & C Pike, Proprietors. The Lime from this Kiln is a clear white and beautiful article of great strength and unequalled for building and finishing purposes. It is acknowledged to be The Best Lime yet Discovered on the Island. It possesses all the properties of the justly celebrated San Juan Lime and is better in some respects, suited for every description of work. The proprietors feel sure that anyone trying this lime once will use no other. Samples may be seen at Mr. W.G. Lukers' Grocery store, corner of Douglas and Cormorant Streets Victoria with whom orders may be left. Orders by mail promptly filled. C&C Pike, Millstream, B.C."
