DEPARTMENT FIRE **NEWS** An important reminder that all open burning within the Highlands requires a permit as of April 1. Hazard ratings are kept up to date on the Fire Department's signs located on the roadside at each entrance to the Highlands, information is posted on the home page of the District web site, highlands.ca. Contact the Fire Chief or Deputy Chief to obtain a permit (see back page for contact information).

Fire Department officials advise that people hiking in local parks would be wise to carry a cell phone with them. In an emergency it has proven easier for responders to find those needing assistance if they have a cell phone with them. Of note: in locations with weak cell phone service, text messages can often still be sent, and many models have 911 GPS capability. Please share this advice with friends and family, too.

IN MEMORY OF KERRY JOY It is with great sadness that we recognize the recent passing of long time Highlands resident Kerry Joy. Kerry and wife Lynne moved to Highlands in 1968 and raised a family in what was then a much smaller community. Kerry served on the very first Highlands Council (1993 - 1996), where he carried the Parks and Recreation portfolio. The Highlands benefited from Kerry's celebrated career as a forester with B.C. Parks as he possessed both an in depth knowledge of nature and a keen understanding of the importance of the people-in-parks experience.

Kerry was an avid Highlands volunteer. He served on the executive of the Highlands District Community Association, Highlands Heritage Park Society, and Highlands Parks and Recreation Association, and was a valued member of most of council's advisory committees and task forces over the years.

For four decades, Kerry volunteered as a Weather Observer with Environment Canada, keeping detailed meteorological records of the Highlands climatic environment. He could always be called upon to discuss any extreme weather event or annual summary, and readily offered up information if any local historical weather records had been challenged.

Kerry's passion for and observation of the natural world was always evident. He modeled proactive environmental stewardship with such actions as monitoring the health of Millstream Creek as it passed through his property, and sharing valuable information on nature and the Highlands with welcoming conversations beginning with "Did you know...?"

Kerry's many meaningful contributions to Highlands will continue to be appreciated and enjoyed by all. His wisdom, positive outlook and many kindnesses will be long remembered by Highlanders, and he will be genuinely missed.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS FOR EARTHQUAKES Given the recent tragic earthquakes in Chile (February 27, 2010), Christchurch New Zealand (September 4, 2010 and Feb 22, 2011) and Japan (March 11, 2011) we need to prepare for a major earthquake on British Columbia's west coast. The Chilean and Japanese earthquakes were so-called "subduction" earthquakes which generated tsunamis as well. The Christchurch earthquakes were "crustal" earthquakes of a more localized and shallow nature. All of these areas, including us, are geographically located on the "Pacific Ring of Fire", a juncture of tectonic plates that circle the Pacific Ocean basin that are prone to both types of earthquakes along with volcanic activity.

Please review the following information sources so you can take 3 basic steps to get prepared in advance for an earthquake:

- Find out what to do before, during and after an earthquake by visiting the links listed below.
- Develop a family emergency plan, so that all family members know what to do and where to go in an emergency.
- Prepare an Emergency Kit so you and your family can be self-sufficient for at least 72 hours (3 days) 7 days is more realistic for isolated areas such as the Highlands.

GREATER VICTORIA PUBLIC LIBRARY BUDGET At its ENJOY THE FLORA AND FAUNA OF HIGHLANDS? Environment March 21st meeting, Council unanimously approved the 2011 GVPL budget, which is up from 2010 by 4.95% (a 1.5% drop from the provisional budget due to hard work by staff and the library board). The increase is due largely to higher usage, negotiated salary increases and decreased funding from the province. Highlands increase of 6.42% is due to new construction, assessment increases higher than average for the region, and a population increase. A top priority for the board was to reinstate Sunday openings, achieved in this budget.

DISTRICT STAFF have received several enquiries about work underway on land in the 3600 block of Munn Road. This work involves tree cutting, land clearing, soil deposit driveway access. The District issued permits for all of the works requiring permits in accordance with the respective Bylaws. In addition, it is of note that while a watercourse is located on the property, the works are beyond 30 metres from it meaning that no riparian area assessment is required. The landowner advised staff that the clearing is being undertaken in order to construct a future agricultural or farm building on the property.

REZONING APPLICATION RZ-01-11 UPDATE As reported last issue, this rezoning application was referred to both the Fiscal and Environmental and Community Infrastructure and Services Select Committees as well as the Advisory Planning Commission for review. REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION PLANNING & GAS TAX PRIORITIES At its March 7 regular meeting, Council received a letter from CRD Chair Geoff Young seeking Council input on the development of a transportation corridor plan for the region. The plan will "set priorities for a regional transportation system and as such will help optimize allocations of available resources from gas tax funds."

CRD staff have been invited to address Council at its April 4 regular meeting to present Phase 1 of the Transportation Corridor Plan which is now complete. They will also seek input on municipal transportation and community planning priorities to both inform Phase 2 and to prioritize transportation projects for regional gas tax funding purposes.

FOOD PRODUCTION & SECURITY—COMMUNITY DISCUSSION

Ninety-five percent of all food consumed on Vancouver Island is imported. There has been much discussion lately on food security, leading to increased desire to buy/grow more local food. As Highland residents are thinking about starting or increasing the yield of their own vegetable gardens, many questions arise, such as:

- Can I buy eggs, beef, vegetables etc. from Highland farmers to support local business?
- What grows well in the Highlands?
- I need some advice on how to start/ improve my vegetable gardens and want to start raising chickens, could someone please offer me some advice?
- I have a typical Highland property, almost all rocks and little to no soil so how can I grow food?

To answer these types of questions, discussions in the community have started about forming a local Highlands food group to help share information.

On **Saturday April 23, 2011** from **1 - 4 p.m.**, come to the **School House**, 1589 Millstream Road, to join the discussion and bring your questions, ideas (and coffee cup!). First, we'll begin with a movie (TBA) for the first hour or so and follow up with open discussion in a question and answer session.

REGIONAL GROWTH STRATEGY - 5 YEAR REVIEW - UPDATE

At the March 21 regular meeting, Council considered its response to the nine policy papers that have been developed for the five year review of the Regional Growth Strategy (RGS). An overview of those papers can be found in the January 2011 edition of the Highlands News. Council recommended "That staff provide a synthesis of Highlands Official Community Plan concepts at a high level and the "descriptions of success" from the draft Integrated Community Sustainability Plan compared against the Goals and Proposed Initiatives from the CRD's Regional Growth Strategy update process as stated in the Policy Directions Summaries." DRAFT 2011-2015 FINANCIAL PLAN At the March 14 Committee of the Whole meeting, CAO Chris Coates provided Council with a power point presentation detailing the first draft of the District's 2011-2015 financial plan. The Fire Department draft budget is anticipated to be received by Council in April. Information included in a staff memo regarding both the CRD Housing Trust Fund and CRD Arts Committee has been forwarded to April's budget agenda. A number of supplemental items have been identified, and of them, planning for the replacement of a disintegrated culvert located at the intersection of Millstream Lake and Munn Roads was approved by Council at its March 21 meeting.

FIRE DEPARTMENT MUTUAL AID AGREEMENT WITH COLWOOD - AMENDMENT At the March 21 regular meeting, Council considered an amendment to the District's Mutual Aid Agreement with the City of Colwood with regard to Fire Department response. The City requested that financial renumeration be added to the existing agreement. As noted in the staff report, Colwood's volunteer fire department has been requested once by Highlands during the past 10 years. The financial renumeration would be reciprocal. HIGHLANDS HISTORY - WILD COWS? Early Highland pioneers seldom fenced their land, allowing their livestock to wander freely in search of food. Sometimes cows would wander off or were abandoned by farmers unable to care for them. Eventually, in the early 1900's, there were a few herds running wild in the Highlands. Caleb Pike's granddaughter, Margaret Dixon, and her sister Mary ran into such a herd on their way home from the Highland School one day. Mary, even though she was older, was too frightened to try passing the animals but Margaret, ten or eleven at the time, was fearless. She ran at the bull, flapping her skirts and chased the herd away. The girls were then able to safely make their way to their home at the far end of Finlayson Arm Road.
