SEEKING WATER WELLS— The District of Highlands and our consultant, Golder Associates Ltd., are

currently working on Phase 2 of our three-year Groundwater Protection Study. As part of the study, Highlands is requesting interested residents to volunteer use of their water well for groundwater monitoring. For inclusion in the groundwater monitoring program, a well must be equipped with a pump, be in an accessible location and have a removable lid. The objective of the groundwater monitoring program is to collect water level and water quality data on a quarterly basis (i.e., every 3 months) for a period of at least one year. Therefore, volunteer well owners are requested to permit access to their well for the duration of the program.

The district and Golder Associates will select wells for the monitoring program based on well locations and completion details (*i.e.*, depth). Following an evaluation of the wells available, volunteers will

be advised whether their well has been selected for the program.

The Highlands office will coordinate with the owners of selected wells to have a technician visit their properties on a quarterly basis to temporarily remove the well lid and measure the water level in the well. A water sample will also be collected. If the residence has a water treatment system, the sample will be collected at a location prior to the treatment system. The privacy of the volunteer well owners will be respected. Names and addresses of the well owners will not be published; rather, each volunteer well will be assigned a number (e.g. DoH-01) for reference purposes. Water level and water quality data will be presented in the Groundwater Protection Study report according to the monitoring well numbers and the locations of the monitoring wells will be shown on Figures. Each volunteer well owner will be provided with water level and water quality results for their well.

If you are interested in volunteering the use of your well for the ground-water monitoring program, please contact Laura Beckett at the District office at

- · your name and address
- is your well accessible?
- · does your well have a removable lid?
- do you have a water treatment system and, if so, is it possible to get a water sample prior to passing through the treatment system?
- the depth of your well and water quality results from previous testing (if known)

The District appreciates those who have already offered their wells for this purpose. If those who have already volunteered their wells no longer wish to offer them, please advise the office. Otherwise, we have your contact information and will add it to the any new volunteers received.


REZONING APPLICATION RZ-07-08 PUBLIC HEARING—Council has given 1st and 2nd reading to Bylaw 319, which would rezone the property at 3813 Munn Road to a new amenity zone, RR5, to add a residential lot to the approximately 41-acre property. A third lot of approximately 13 acres would be created and donated to CRD parks in future. The lot is adjacent to Thetis Lake Regional Park. Council has scheduled a public hearing to precede the next Council meeting on July 13th, at 7pm at the School House.

MILLSTREAM MEADOWS—On June 8th, Council hosted a public information session for the Millstream Meadows remediation project. Teams from CRD Environmental Department and Golder Associates presented an overview of the project to date, and answered questions from council and the public. The work plan for 2009 will see recovery wells installed and infilling completed in Lagoon 1, the area where hydrocarbon contaminate was removed in 2008. Characterization of the contents of the remainder of Lagoon 2 will be completed, with a report containing recommendations for 2010 expected to the CRD board this fall. Monitoring of ground and surface water will continue.

2009 LAND SUMMIT – WHISTLER, BC—A better future: adapting to change was the theme of the 2009 BC Land Summit held in Whistler, BC on May 20-22. Members of six professional organizations including the BC Planning Institute of BC, and the BC institute of Agrologists along with government officials and land management practitioners from across the Province, gathered to discuss issues related to sustainability and climate change. Councillor Dobb attended this conference with partial support from the District, and took in two full days of sessions on subjects ranging from sustainable consumption for local government, to future prospects for agricultural land in BC. A report on the conference was shared at the regular council meeting on June 15, and with the Sustainability Task Force on June 16. Residents with specific questions regarding the Land Summit or the Highlands Sustainability Task force are invited to contact Councillor Dobb.

CRD SERVICES—General Manager of CRD Corporate Services Diana Lokken attended Council on June 1st to give an overview of shared services provided by the CRD, to which Highlands contributed roughly \$156,000 this year through tax requisitions. One of the largest functions provided is solid waste disposal, which includes recycling, but this is entirely paid for through Hartland landfill tipping fees. Other major services in which Highlands participates include Regional Parks (about \$40,000/year), Millstream Meadows remediation (\$8,256 this year), fire dispatch (\$7697), CREST emergency communications (\$7,944), debts for both the Juan de Fuca swimming pool (\$25,386) and library building (\$7,796), and animal control (\$15,401).

WILDFIRE FORUMS Two Wildfire Forums were held in early June,



one at each fire hall. About 100 residents attended the forums, and were presented with important information from the district's Emergency Plan Coordinator, Val Fletcher, and representatives from both CRD Parks Operations and BC Forests Protection branch. Councillor Johannesen provided an overview of the ongoing work of the district's Emergency Planning Committee. Thank you to all who attended, and all those who helped to organize the forums. TWINFLOWER PARK—Due to soil settlement on the Twinflower Park playing field, Council has authorized a short-term remediation project to be carried out by the Highlands Parks and Recreation Association, which manages the park. Work is expected to be completed for the annual community baseball game at the Highland Fling, on September 13th. Council will also engage a consultant to recommend long-term plans to address the problem.
