Training takes place once per week at the fire halls on Thursday evenings commencing at 6:30 pm. We invite you to contact the Fire Chief and make arrangements to stop by and see if it's for

you.

Meanwhile, the district encourages residents and Highlands visitors to continue to be diligent regarding fire prevention. Additionally, while the risk of fire is rated at high or extreme, if you are planning to run equipment or machinery in or near atrisk areas, you are asked to contact the Fire Chief for guidance regarding reducing the risk of fire ahead of time.

August looks to be a quieter month for council, with just one scheduled council meeting. We do hope our committee members are finding time to recharge, as we anticipate that September will lead into a busy few months! Plan to attend the Fling in September, and watch for a number of invitations for residents to provide input on various topics in the fall.

2009 PROPERTY TAXES REMINDER—This is a reminder that as of 4:00pm September 1, 2009 an additional 5% penalty will be added to any outstanding 2009 property taxes.

Outstanding taxes that are in arrears (1 year overdue) and delinquent (2 years overdue) will continue to accrue daily interest at a rate set by the province.

This summer we've been seeing unprecedented heat and drought conditions, and the danger of fire is EXTREME. If you see or smell smoke or any other signs of fire, PLEASE CALL 9-1-1 IMMEDIATELY.



Your call will be routed to the appropriate department. This will be much quicker and more effective than calling the municipal office. If you'd like information about road closures and power outages, then call the office.

Millstream Lake Road Grass Fire On Wednesday, July 29, at about noon, a grass fire broke out on Millstream Lake Road near Davies Road under the transmission lines. Responders included 15 members of the Highlands Fire Department, (most of whom left work to fight the fire), six members of Langford's Volunteer Fire Department, and a BC Forest Protection Officer from Cobble Hill who arrived via helicopter.

Thanks to an observant passer-by, the impressively guick response, and the adept skills of our firefighters, the 30m by 30m fire was fully contained within a short time.

The district's Emergency Coordinator, Val Fletcher, was also on site. He ensured the firefighters stayed hydrated as they worked through one of the hottest days of the year, and kept district staff and the public informed regarding road closures, the power outage, and evacuations.

The fire is suspected to have been started by a discarded cigarette.

EAGLE'S LAKE PARKING ISSUES Visitors to Eagle's

Lake have reached unprecedented numbers this summer, creating local parking challenges. The district is looking at options to manage parking in the area; meanwhile, visitors can assist by being mindful of leaving clear access to driveways, Eagles Lake Road, the dry hydrant, and the fire hall while they are enjoying the lake.



WATER CONSERVATION This year's historically low water table and extended lack of precipitation is causing water concerns in rural communities throughout Vancouver Island, including Highlands. As all

Highlands residents rely on ground or surface water to run their households, it is an important time to find ways to reduce water consumption to help ensure quantity and quality remain viable until recharge occurs during winter.

For tips on water conservation, residents can find plenty of information on the internet. Locally, the Capital Regional District has a number of documents which provide ideas and solutions for reducing water consumption. To access the CRD's materials, phone 250-360-3000, or visit online at <crd.bc.ca> (type 'water tips' into site search bar).

The provincial government hosts a Living Water Smart program that includes an online home assessment and other helpful information. Navigate to livingwatersmart.ca> to learn more.



The Vancouver Island Health Authority recommends that you test your drinking water for quality on a regular basis. Both MB Labs and Cantest Labs are government approved water testing providers, and are listed in the Victoria are yellow pages.

There is a fee for service.

TWINFLOWER PARK VANDALISM - WHY?

You only have to phone and I will be glad to show you what's inside! Inside the shed or pump house are the pressure tank for the well and the sensitive electronic controls for the irrigation system. When damage occurs, repairs cost Highlands taxpayers money.

If anyone knows who is damaging the pump house beside the bicycle jump park, would you kindly suggest to them that repairs cost money and we don't need extra expenses on a facility that is for the benefit of Highlands residents, especially for our young people. Phone me at (250) 478-4403 and I will meet you at the pump house to show you what is inside. We also do not need graffiti on the outside.

I would like to thank the jump park users for going around the field and not disturbing the reseeding. It is anticipated that the field will be ready for use in mid September. Thank you for your cooperation. Bob McMinn

Highlands Community Green Map Banner

At its regular meeting on July 13th, Council was presented with a banner by Elaine Limbrick, representing the Highlands Green Mapping Group. The beautiful banner, a gift from the West Shore Arts Council, depicts the Highlands Green Map, and will hang in the Old School House.

A reminder that a copy of the Green Map is available for Highland residents and can be picked up from the District Office.

Siphon Pipe - Council has approved a request from Langford Council for the installation of a "tight" sewer pipe along a portion of Hanington Road. The previous Council had already approved much of the route, but a small section (160 metres) of Hanington Road had been left out, and without Council approval the pipe would have had to cross private property for completion, a crossing which would, according to a consultant's report, have necessitated the removal of 137 trees in Highlands. Council has requested that staff consult the builders to form a work plan that would inconvenience Highlanders as little as possible, including provisions to work only nights and weekends, and formulation of a traffic management plan.

Eagles Lake Cob Washroom—The cob composting toilet at Eagles Lake has made excellent progress in July! The foundation is complete and the cob walls are rising quickly, thanks to Gord and Ann Baird, who have been working daily on the project. Sadly, the foundation suffered damage due to weekend vandals at the lake. A watchful Highlander reported a licence plate number and the vandals have been contacted and have apologized for their actions.

The damage was thankfully minor and easily repaired.

Suzy the Tiger Suzy the Tiger, recently of Millstream Road, has been relocated to the BC mainland by her owner, Highlands resident Dave Bennett. Suzy is reportedly in the company of other tigers on a large acreage, and it is hoped that she settles happily into her new home.

School House Quilt - A group of Highlands quilters led by Daphne Allen has completed a quilt with 16 panels, each showing a unique representation of the Old School House and each made by a different member of the group. The unique quilt, begun in 2007, commemorates the 115th anniversary of the School House, and was presented to Council at its regular meeting on July 13th. It resides in the School House for all to enjoy.




Rezoning No. RZ-07-08 After a public hearing at which none of the speakers objected to the rezoning, Council adopted a bylaw (Bylaw 319) allowing an

additional residential lot on the 41-acre Munn Road property. The rezoning includes a 13-acre land donation to CRD Parks for park/conservation use, which will occur before final subdivision approval. The property is bounded on two sides by Thetis Lake Regional Park.

The Valley Course Open House To Be Rescheduled The folks at Bear Mountain have requested a postponement of an Open House and tour of Highlands golf course, originally slated for August, until September or early October. The event will provide an opportunity for Highlands council, committee members, and residents to view the course and the work done to date. Details will be made available as they become known.


