H1N1 FLU VIRUS UPDATE FROM OUR EMERGENCY PLAN COORDINATOR—VAL FLETCHER*

As we are approaching the normal fall flu season as well as the potential "second wave" of the H1N1 flu virus please review the following information relating to the flu. This and additional information is available from the BC Government H1N1 Flu Virus web site at http://www.gov.bc.ca/h1n1/ and the Vancouver Island Health Authority web site at http://www.viha.ca/h1n1/.

Those who do not have internet access may obtain additional printed information at the District Office.

GET THE FACTS ABOUT FLU AND STAY HEALTHY

Influenza is caused by viruses, and is generally spread when an infected person coughs or sneezes.

Here are six simple, common sense precautions that can help safeguard everyone's health:

- Stay home when you're sick or have influenza symptoms. Get plenty of rest and check with a health care provider as needed.
- Avoid close contact with people who are sick. If you are sick, keep your distance from others to protect them from getting sick.
- Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when coughing or sneezing, and throw the tissue away immediately. It may prevent those around you from getting sick.



4) Wash your hands. Washing your hands often will help protect you from getting sick. When soap and water are not available, use

alcohol-based disposable hand wipes or gel sanitizers.

 Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth. You can become ill by touching a surface contaminated with germs and then touching your eyes, nose or mouth. 6) Practice other good health habits. Get plenty of sleep, be physically active, manage stress, drink plenty of fluids, eat nutritious foods, and avoid smoking, which may increase the risk of serious consequences if you do contract the flu.

If you have a fever or cough illness, regardless of where you have travelled, stay home from work or school and limit contact with others to keep from infecting them. See a health care provider if your symptoms become worse but call ahead of time to let them know you have fever or cough illness.

You can call HealthLink BC at 8-1-1, 24 hours a day/seven days a week to speak to a nurse if you have more questions or if feeling ill.

H1N1 INFO FOR PEOPLE WITH CHRONIC HEALTH CONDITIONS

Adults and children with chronic health conditions are one group of the population that is at higher risk of contracting and suffering complications from the H1N1 flu virus. These are the same health conditions that make people eligible for the seasonal flu vaccine (diabetes, chronic heart or lung conditions, asthma, etc.). Besides common sense precautions such as staying home if you're sick or coughing into your

sleeve, there are a number of other steps you can take to best protect yourself.

Before you get the flu:

During one of your regular doctor visits prior to the fall, talk with your doctor about whether you should get a prescription for antivirals in advance. As antivirals work best when taken within 24 hours of showing flu symptoms, in the event you get sick in the fall, you can just call your doctor to get this prescription filled.

You may also wish to find a "flu buddy" to assist you in accessing medication in the event you become ill and unable to travel. Talk to your doctor about having a two-week supply of medication on hand. Be alert to changes in your breathing, especially if you have heart failure, congestive heart disease or Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD). Inform family members or close friends of your medical condition.

If you get the flu:

Treat any fever right away with fever-reducing medicine such as Tylenol. Call your doctor to get your prescription for antiviral medication filled. Seek medical attention if your symptoms worsen or if you experience chest pain or shortness of breath. If you use medications for your condition, continue taking it even if you become sick with the flu, unless your doctor or health care provider says otherwise.

If you do have to travel outside the home while you have flu symptoms, wearing a simple surgical mask will help protect others from your coughing.

You can call HealthLink BC at 8-1-1, 24 hours a day/seven days a week to speak to a nurse if you have more questions or are concerned about any illness/symptoms experienced by you or your children.

Council & District News

COMMUNITY HALL PROCESS At its regular meeting on September 8th, Council considered the funding agreement with the Province for the construction of a Community Hall and museum. A \$500,000 Towns for Tomorrow grant (which includes \$30,000 for the museum) has been awarded to Highlands by the Ministry of Community Development, and Council had previously requested that two items be deleted from the agreement. Council's requests were:

- 1. removal of the reference to 12,000 square feet for the proposed size of the community hall, and
- 2. removal of the words "solar panels and roof top gardens in Schedule "A", which reads "the utilization of green building technologies which may include solar panels and roof top gardens".

Council was advised that the first request was approved by the Ministry of Community Development, but the second request was significant to the application approval and would not be removed. Project completion deadline under the Towns for Tomorrow Program is March 31st, 2011. Council approved the amended agreement.

Council held a committee-of-the-whole on September 14th to discuss next steps. Recommendations adopted by Council are:

- 1. that the Community Centre Task Force bring forward a schedule for moving this project forward to the public consultation stage,
- 2. that staff research any funding left over from previous funds set aside for conceptual drawings,
- 3. that the Community Centre Task Force bring forward a list of essential key elements identified up to this point on what the Community Hall might consist of, and
- 4. that staff prepare a report for Council on corporate management issues dealing with proposals for this project.

SCOUTS FUNDRAISING EVENT Scouts Canada, Greater Victoria Area has organized their 2009 Apple Day fund-raising drive on Saturday, October 3, 9am— 3pm. A small number of members will be staffing a site in the Highlands, seeking donations to further Scout youth programs and Camp Barnard. Passers-by are asked to support Scouting and are thanked with an apple, a tag and a smile.

BRITISH COLUMBIA YOUTH PARLIAMENT, 81ST

PARLIAMENT will be held in Victoria at the Provincial Legislative Chambers from December 27 to 31, 2009. The Youth Parliament is a province-wide non-partisan organization for young people ages 16 to 21. It teaches citizenship skills through participation in the December parliamentary session and in community service activities throughout the year. Youth Parliament is a one year commitment. Each municipal or regional government may nominate two applicants.

If you'd like to apply to sit as a member of the Youth Parliament, please contact the municipal office. Youth Parliament is non-partisan, and applicants need only be interested in learning more about the parliamentary process and in serving their community.

TRAFFIC ADVISORY FOR MILLSTREAM/

HANINGTON ROADS Approvals have been granted for both the installation of the Hanington Road siphon, a closed sewer pipe from Langford, and the installation of a water main to service the Millstream Road Industrial Park. Construction has begun and will be completed in late October. Millstream Road traffic will be impeded during construction, but the District has required that one lane traffic be allowed only between 9am and 4pm to minimize disruption to commuter traffic. The Traffic Management Plan contains priority provisions for school buses and of course for emergency vehicles. Additional stipulations in the approvals granted by the District are that:

- 1. barricades with flashing lights must be used, given there are no street lights,
- 2. the road must be suitably restored daily, and
- 3. there must be two-way traffic in the evenings.

The District of Highlands apologizes for any inconvenience during this construction period.
