CHIEF FORD STEPS DOWN After serving over 30 years as Chief of the Highlands Volunteer Fire Department, Chief Barry Ford has announced his retirement from this role at the end of this year. Barry became Chief of the East Highlands Fire Department shortly after it was registered as a society in 1978; East and West Fire Departments were joined when Highlands incorporated in 1993 and Barry was chosen to be Highlands Fire Chief. His career in firefighting has been outstanding: in 2005 he received the inaugural CFAX 9-1-1 award, given to a member of protective services in the region who has gone above and beyond to serve their community. In 2009 he was presented with an award from the Governor General of Canada recognizing 30 years of firefighting in the District. Chief Ford has led the district's volunteer firefighters organization from humble beginnings to the terrific force it is today - an admirable



accomplishment by any measure, and has earned the gratitude and appreciation of Highlanders for doing so. Barry's leadership and dedication to task will be missed, and we wish him the very best in his retirement.

## **Community News**

#### STEPS TOWARD SUSTAINABILITY FOR THE HIGHLANDS

The District of Highlands along with communities throughout British Columbia is taking steps toward sustainability and addressing the critical issue of Climate Change.

- In October 2008, Highlands Council signed BC's Climate Action Charter committing to actions that reduce Green House Gases and planning principles that create livable and sustainable community.
- Earlier this year, Council established a task force to identify and recommend initiatives to help create a more sustainable Highlands. The nine member task force completed its work over the course of 8 meetings, and has put the final touches on a report to be delivered early in December. The report findings will be shared with council and the community at an upcoming Committee of the Whole meeting.
- Under requirements of Bill 27, an amendment to the Local Government Act, every Municipality and Regional District in the Province must incorporate Green House Gas (GHG) reduction targets into Official Community Plans (OCP) by May 31, 2010. A community consultation process is planned for early next year to the make the necessary amendments to the Highlands OCP.
- Transportation in the form of personal vehicle trips to work, school and recreation is the largest source of local GHG emissions in the Highlands. Improving the efficiency of transportation from and within the Highlands will be necessary to meet community GHG reduction targets and ensure long term sustainability.
- Improved public transit will be a component in a sustainable transportation network. The planning department at BC Transit has just committed to holding a public consultation process with the District of Highlands to get input for a 25 year vision for transit in the region. A Transit forum is being planned for the spring to coincide with the ongoing discussion around GHG reduction targets for the Highlands and sustainability.

### **Council & District News**

**CREST** Tests conducted by Motorola over the summer have shown that the CREST communications system, which connects all municipal emergency services, as well as BC Ambulance and BC Transit, has been performing to or exceeding international standards after major improvements were made over the past year. Staff has also reported that the system worked flawlessly during the recent Olympic Torch Relay, which required a heavy volume of communication traffic.

A task force has been struck to address concerns raised by the Victoria Police Department, which favours a move to a 700 MHz system, a move that could incur significant extra costs. A report on implications of a possible change in systems will be presented to the CREST board early in 2010.

#### A CLOSER LOOK AT HERITAGE

**PROTECTION** In October Council and staff began work on a District heritage policy, one of the strategic priorities identified earlier in the year. An opportunity to consider heritage status for the original Gregory House, a recent recommendation regarding Ross Durrance Road received from the Fiscal Environment Select Committee, and updated legislative tools that could provide better protection for places such as the Caleb Pike are providing rationale to move forward. A staff report outlining heritage conservation tools available to local government led to a Committee of the Whole meeting on November 9. Pam Copley, a regional planner with the BC Heritage Branch, was invited to provide more information. The meeting was well attended by residents, and district staff is preparing a report on next steps.

GREATER VICTORIA PUBLIC LIBRARY BOARD The GVPL has presented a draft 2010 budget to its member Councils. In order to keep to its 5-year financial plan, which projects a 6.5% increase in municipal contributions, the Library Board has proposed cuts to programs as a result of provincial funding cutbacks and decreased revenues from fines. Fine revenue is \$187,000 lower since the library began sending out email reminders to borrowers when materials are nearly due. The provincial government has cut back its library operating grant by 5.5%, as well as making significant cuts to other provincially-funded grants such as the BC OneCard program (allowing anyone in the province with a library card to borrow from any participating library), the Literacy Grant (cut by 85%), a Resource Sharing Grant (cut by 25%), and a technology grant (which has been eliminated). These cuts come at a time when public demand for library services, circulation, and programs continues to increase. average circulation growth rate over the 2nd and 3rd quarters in 2009 was 17% compared to the same periods in 2008.

Cuts recommended by library management staff include a \$225,000 reduction in acquisition of new library materials, Sunday closings to all branches except Central and Goudy branches and reductions in conferences and travel budgets, database subscriptions, strategic planning costs, hardware, and board special events. Initiatives that will be canceled or postponed will include the Writer in Residence initiative and the local history digitization initiative. In addition, surplus funds from 2007 and 2008 will be fully utilized in 2010.

One of the programs cut by the provincial government was Books for BC Babies, a program which began distributing free book kits to parents with newborns in 2006. Books are available in 9 languages, and the book and CD in each kit are tangible ways to encourage parents to read to and sing with their babies right from birth. The program has had impressive results: 91% of recipients planned to attend a library program, 60% of parents planned to read to their babies more often, 48% used the library more often, and 33% joined the library. Costs for the program in 2009 was \$13,540 in the Victoria area. Since the GVPL board considered this to be an important program, efforts were made to find private sponsors. As a result, TD Bank and the Steve Nash Foundation are funding the program at least until the spring of 2010, a ripple of good news in the sea of cuts.

**CONSTRUCTION AT MOUNT WORK REGIONAL PARK** Construction work is now underway for the new park entrance at Munn Road in Mount Work Regional Park. The target for completion is in December 2009. The site development plan for the Munn Road parking lot upgrades was presented to the District of Highlands Council in August. #### HIGHLANDS HISTORY - DID YOU KNOW? An excerpt from the

Victoria Daily Colonist, Sunday December 19, 1897: The closing exercises at Highland district school were held on Friday last, with a large attendance of parents and others interested in the school and the progress of the pupils. In connection with the closing exercises the children had a well filled Christmas tree, with a generous distribution of gifts by the typical understudy of Sir Santa Claus: and addresses were given by Trustees Simpson and Mrs. Dixon, each of whom complimented the teachers upon the good work accomplished during the term and expressed regret at the absence--enforced by illness--of Trustee Scafe. Before taking leave of school for the holidays, the pupils presented their teacher, Miss E.A. Clarke, with a beautiful album, as a Christmas souvenir.
