## **Traffic Safety Commission Seeks** Feedback on Malahat Point-to- CRD TRAFFIC SAFET **Point Speed Enforcement**



The Ministry of Public Safety and Solicitor General is seeking public comment on the possibility of a pilot project on the Malahat using a system known as "point-to-point speed enforcement."

The Capital Regional District's (CRD) Traffic Safety Commission has proposed that the Malahat Highway be used for such a trial project because speed is a factor in many of the crashes on the Malahat, and also because it's a "high-consequence" traffic corridor. If a crash requires that the Malahat be closed – and many do – it frequently affects Highlands along Finlayson Arm Road and Millstream Road.

The system differs from old-style "photo radar" in that it penalizes only those drivers who are speeding over a significant stretch of highway, not someone who may be speeding for only a moment. As well, drivers are warned repeatedly and well in advance by signage that their speed will be monitored, avoiding any suggestion they were entrapped by the system.

A study in Scotland showed that when the system was installed on a highway that had been plagued with multiple crashes, the number of fatalities and serious injuries dropped by 74%. Similar studies in Australia, Italy, Austria and the Netherlands found that fatalities dropped between 50% and 70%.

### Asset Management

"Asset Management – Maintain assets in an appropriate state of repair; optimize capital investments to meet public and economic needs while achieving value for the investment."

As one of the Strategic Plan deliverables, the District embarked upon a process to develop an Asset Management Plan working with the Brentwood Advisory Group. This was done with the assistance of a grant from UBCM.

A draft plan was developed, and an Open House was subsequently held to obtain input from residents, which was incorporated into a revised draft considered by Committee of the Whole on February 13th. The Committee of the Whole recommended adoption of the plan to Council, and that recommendation was ratified at the February 19th Council meeting. The Plan and accompanying documentation is available on the District's website or through the District Office.

For 2018, the focus will be on developing better road asset information and implementing a Pavement Management Plan to assist in determining the appropriate level of funding needed to maintain the road system. Then in 2019 the District can focus on building a long term financial approach to asset management.

Adoption of the Asset Management Plan will start the District on the path of Sustainable Asset Management. This will allow the District to continue to effectively provide services to the community and protect future generations of Highlands' residents.

### Regional Growth Strategy

**Capital Regional District** 

At the February 5, 2018 Meeting, Council considered and accepted the revised version of the CRD's Regional Growth Strategy (RGS). The document was the subject of a non-binding mediation process in December 2017. The mediation resulted in agreement among the participating parties on all 32 disputed items. In mid January, the CRD referred the revised RGS to all member municipalities for acceptance. If a municipality does not reply by the deadline of March 16 either accepting or refusing the RGS, that municipality will be deemed to have accepted it. As of February 21, nine out of 13 municipalities have accepted the RGS, and none have refused it. If acceptance is not unanimous, the RGS process will proceed to binding arbitration. If there is unanimous acceptance, the CRD Board will have the option of adopting the RGS bylaw. Once adopted, member municipalities have two years to provide to the CRD "regional context statements" for acceptance. Currently, there is staff-level discussion to offer a standardized format for regional context statements across the CRD. This move would provide a simpler and standardized format for everyone.

## **CRD Regional Transportation Service**

Bylaw No. 4093 At the January 22, 2018 Meeting,

Council supported CRD's Bylaw No. 4093 which would create a Regional Transportation Service. The services included are those that can be most cost- effective delivered at a regional scale - namely data collection, programming and lobbying for funding of regional priorities.

The proposed bylaw provides for municipal requisitioning to cover the costs of expanded services. Any increases beyond current spending (\$1.5 million) would have to be approved by a majority of the Board. Any increases beyond the requisition cap of \$2.5 million would have to be approved by a majority of the Board and 2/3 of municipal Councils or whatever approval process was used to adopt the bylaw. With floor to celling windows over looking a natural wetland ecosystem. the <u>Community Hall</u> offers a 1200 square foot assembly area which can seat up to 100 people at tables. 112 theatre type seating, and 72 conference type seating. The warming kitchen comes equipped with coffee and tea service, and full dinnerware for up to 50 people. The stage area is visually beautiful and acoustically designed.

The Caleb Pike Heritage Park can be rented for almost any event. Both the Caleb Pike House and the Schoolhouse are available for rent either separately or together. The use of the park grounds is included with the rental. A new renovation in the Dairy provides a VIHA certified serving kitchen. Rental prices include set up of table and chairs, and lighting of the wood-stove in the Caleb Pike House. Renters need to bring any items such as flip charts or slide-projectors. A high speed ADSL wireless internet connection is available in the Schoolhouse.
