Wildfire Season Is Not Over

This past month, our province's battle against the worst wildfire season on record raged on. Now, with nearly 2 million hectares of land lost to the fires burning across the province and a provincial state of emergency issued, the need for preparedness is critical.



Although the Highlands is not currently facing any threats of wildfire, we are entering a very dangerous time for our area as the risk of a wildfire can remain well into October. Currently, the wildfire danger level in the Highlands remains on HIGH even with rain we have had in September, and with the colder nights residents are now turning to their wood stoves to heat their homes.

As the Wildfire danger historically has remained high through September in our area, it is imperative that residents report columns of smoke, adhere to our local outdoor fire bans (even if it's raining) and ensure that their woodstoves are CSA rated and utilize an approved spark arrestor to prevent ignitions in the surrounding forest.

Last year we extinguished 2 wildfires in Gowlland Tod Park, one started on Aug 30 and the other on Oct 4.

The Fire Department, through its partnership with FireSmart is continually providing seminars and information for our residents about wildfire resiliency and preparedness around their property, and most recently FireSmart has updated their Last-Minute Checklist with new information. Now known as the Emergency Wildfire Preparedness Checklist, we encourage residents to download this resource and familiarize themselves with the steps they can take to be prepared for an emergency:

As Wildfires won't wait for you to make a plan, residents are strongly encouraged to visit the FireSmart BC website for information on how to prepare their home, their property and their families for a wildfire: https://firesmartbc.ca/

However, if a wildfire is threatening your area, the priority is getting out safely!

In the Highlands, our primary method for disseminating emergency notifications to our residents is through the utilization of a public alerting notification system known as Alertable. These notifications serve to furnish essential details regarding the emergency, encompassing information about its nature, the areas affected, whether the notification is classified as an Alert or an Order, and crucial instructions for residents to adhere to, including the recommended evacuation routes if deemed necessary. To sign up for emergency Alerts please go to www.westshorealert.ca and click on the Highlands logo or you can also download the Alertable app and subscribe to the Highlands area notifications.

An evacuation alert means you need to be ready to leave at a moment's notice. If you are on an alert and preparing to evacuate, assess your home, and complete the items on the Emergency Wildfire Preparedness Checklist.

An evacuation order means the time to prepare is over. YOU NEED TO LEAVE IMMEDIATELY. ~Fire Chief Ford

South Highlands Local Area Plan



Accessibility Plan

In 2021, British Columbia passed the Accessible BC Act, mandating municipalities to create an Accessibility Plan to enhance access to municipal services, programs, and infrastructure. The goal is to ensure that everyone can fully participate in the community. The plan addresses issues in information, communications, technologies, policies, practices, and infrastructure, with a long-term vision of a barrier-free community.

The Accessibility Plan focuses initially on Employment and Service Delivery standards, with a commitment to ongoing improvements. It must be reviewed and updated every three years, incorporating input from public engagement initiatives. An Accessibility Committee, initially comprised of staff from partner municipalities, is tasked with improving accessibility practices. Public participation and feedback are encouraged to identify and eliminate barriers, enhancing access and inclusion for all. We invite your feedback.
