Fire Department News

The District of Highlands has been on an EXTREME fire hazard rating since July 31st, 2020. This means absolutely NO burning is permitted in the District - NO open fires, campfires, incinerators, woodstoves, chimneys, tiki torches etc.



When weather changes occur, it can take weeks before the fire hazard falls to a level where it is safe to burn. September in Highlands is historically our driest and busiest time of the year, and we must all remain vigilant in insuring our community is safe, so early spotting and reporting of any burning or fires is prudent in keeping any incidents as small as possible. Residents are also reminded that all reports of burning are 100% confidential, and are encouraged to contact the Fire Chief at 250-920-6970 or Firechief@highlands.ca if they see anything of concern.

CREST Tower Upgrade Improves Communication

Historically, due to the topography of Highlands, emergency services have struggled with radio communications when responding to incidents in the north and remote areas of the District. Over the past 3 years, CREST has been undergoing a regional technology upgrade to a P25 standard. This year, as part of that regional upgrade and to improve the emergency communications in Highlands, CREST staff searched for a location in the Highlands to install a small tower to fill in the large gaps in signal within the District. In August that tower was commissioned, and hands on testing has shown that every area that previously had ZERO signal is now an area where police, fire and ambulance can easily communicate with each other throughout the entire District! ~Fire Chief Ford

Drainage Culvert Replacements

You may have noticed some road work taking place in your neighbourhoods at the following locations to replace four drainage culverts:

- 644 Millstream Lake Road (near Davies Road)
- 3304 Woodridge Place (south of Verona Crescent)Thursday, August 27th, 2020 full day road closure from 8:30 am to 4:00 pm
- 3507 Woodridge Place (south of Eagles Lake Road) Wednesday, September 2, 2020 full day road closure from 8:30 am to 4:00 pm
- Raven Heights (near Woodridge Place) Friday, September 4th, 2020 full day road closure from 8:30 am to 4:00 pm

This work will be done in accordance with Federal Fisheries guidelines and best practices for road culvert replacements. The work is scheduled to take place between August 25th and September 18th during the hours of 7:30 am to 4:30 pm. In most cases, single lane traffic will be maintained during construction with traffic delays of up to 15 minutes. This schedule is dependent on weather conditions and other scheduling factors that may delay the work. Please check the District website for the most up to date information. Your patience is appreciated while we complete this important work.



Community and Council News

Boundary Reduction Proposal from Ecoasis Developments

Highlands Council was approached by Ecoasis Developments LLP with a proposal to reduce the boundary of the District of Highlands and transfer the Bear Mountain Resort lands (431 acres) to the City of Langford. As your elected representatives tasked with acting in the best interests of the community as a whole, Highlands Council carefully considered the concept of a boundary change and the related proposal.

Acknowledging that the District of Highlands is a financially stable community, able to appropriately fund the services and projects that are important to the community and our significant progress towards ensuring sustainable asset management through long term financial planning, Council unanimously decided not to support the proposed boundary reduction.

The decision of Council also took into consideration its obligations to the original intentions behind incorporating as a municipality 26 years ago. Protecting and preserving the natural environment of all District lands, which include a portion of what is now Bear Mountain Resort, remains a priority as well as ensuring the best interests of the residents and property owners of the District of Highlands remain our first priority. An Alternative Fling Event

The Highlands District Community Association and the Highland Heritage Parks Society have decided not to hold the Highlands Fling this year due to the restrictions required because of the pandemic. However, organizers would like to reach out to residents and have come up with a safe and simple community event that would respect Dr. Henry's guidelines. HDCA and HHPS volunteers will be at Caleb Pike Park on August 29th and September 6th from 1-4 pm and at the intersection of Munn's Road and Woodridge Place on August 30th and September 5th from 1-4 pm to hand out free wrapped ice cream bars and granola bars and say hello to our neighbours. Volunteers will ensure that physical distancing of 2 metres is maintained and hand-sanitizing stations will be available. Food handlers will be masked and gloved. Donations to the Goldstream Food Bank will be accepted at the event. Cash donations are preferred by the Food Bank and egg cartons are needed.

Golder Associates Review of Ecoasis Groundwater Management Reports

Council considered the following report at its July 13 Meeting: https://www.highlands.ca/AgendaCenter/ViewFile/Item/5800?fileID=5953. As background, in 2018, Golder and Associates recommended reviewing the water balance analysis that Ecoasis had done on their lands with respect to groundwater use for golf irrigation. The purpose of that analysis was to ultimately request changes to the restrictive covenant ("master development agreement" done in 2005) that the District has with Ecoasis that controls groundwater use. In February 2016, the Water Sustainability Act and supporting regulations came into force that offered a groundwater licensing program for non-domestic users. This legislation did not exist when the District and Ecoasis entered into the restrictive covenant. Ecoasis applied for an in-use groundwater license in 2017. At that July 13 Meeting, Council resolved to defer consideration of any changes to the master development agreement pending consultation with the Province through the groundwater licensing application process.

Groundwater Protection Implementation and Work Plan Is In Motion!

At the end of 2019, Council endorsed a plan that incorporates previous and new consultant recommendations into a practical and organized "to do list" for actions towards groundwater protection. Actions are sequential and organized into categories of science, planning and community stewardship – all of which are inter-related.

Due to some leftover funds from the grant to do the work plan, the District was able to start its first items on this to do list – community aquifers delineation and mapping work. This project looked at the aquifer itself and was able to establish smaller areas with similar characteristics – thus "community aquifers". Please see image. 

Millstream Meadows Contamination Migration

Unfortunately some contaminants from Millstream Meadows (1965 Millstream Road) has migrated to the Municipal Office property (1980 Millstream Road). In fall of 2019, the CRD conducted expanded groundwater testing to continue the investigation towards their Certificate of Compliance pursuant to the *Contaminated Sites Regulation* for Millstream Meadows. The owners of Millstream Meadows (CRD and BC Ministry of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development (FLNRORD) are required to remediate it. Use of Poisons for Rodent Control

The District has received a number of letters from concerned members of the public about the wide-spread use of rat poison (anticoagulant rodenticides) and the resulting negative impacts. Members of the community are assured that the District does not use any rat poison in our municipal operations.

There are many harmful impacts of using anticoagulant rodenticides. Non-target species like birds, pets, and even our children may accidentally eat these poisons. Rat poison acts by causing internal bleeding which is why poisoned rodents become VERY thirsty and can been seen out in the open looking for water as they die a slow and painful death. Poisoned rodents become easy prey for other creatures like owls, hawks, vultures, and our pets. The poison is still active and can kill other wildlife up the food chain.

Owls eat about three rodents per night (1000 per year), so inadvertently killing owls and other predators can actually lead to higher rodent populations.

We encourage Highlanders to use other forms of rodent control like traps, but as always, the best approach is to keep our yards free of rodent attractants. Rat trap design has improved significantly for ease of use. Please think about your neighbours and wild creatures when considering rodent control methods.

Community Hall Landscaping – Pergola Installation

Phase 1 of the Community Hall landscaping project began with raised gardens immediately behind the auditorium that were completed in 2019. As a continuation of Phase 1 of this project, at its July meeting, Council approved a design concept for a pergola to be installed between the two gardens. The design concept is for a wrought iron open roof design that would be ideal for weddings and wedding photos. The pergola, that will fit well into the natural landscape, will not shade the garden plants and will allow plants to train on the structure. A local artisan will be commissioned to construct the pergola that will be made of 85% recycled material. To the left is a photo of the Community Hall landscaping where the pergola will be placed.

Bow Hunting Bylaw Map Update

At its August 17th Meeting, Council adopted an updated map for the bow hunting bylaw. The map now reflects parcels that met original criteria for the prohibition of bow hunting. Criteria included properties within rural residential zones, parkland, and municipally-owned land. Also added to properties that are prohibited from bow hunting were daycare zones, properties with conservation covenants, and the Mary Lake Nature Sanctuary. Please note that, in addition to complying with all Provincial Hunting Regulations, it is necessary to obtain a permit accompanied by a \$20 fee, to hunt in the District. You must receive permission from the property owner. 
Highlands Community Garden Has Survived the Pandemic
