DISTRICT TAKES STEPS TOWARD SUSTAINABILITY The District continues to chart a course toward sustainability with Council's adoption of a sustainability road map developed by the Sustainability Task Force. The road map, which lays out a series of recommendations for council in a clear sequence of steps, was originally presented to Council December 7 by Andrew Fall, task force Chair. More discussion on the report took place at a well attended Committee of Whole on January 18, where Council recommended adoption of the road map concept.

The task force report contains a total of 42 recommendations covering topics from transportation and building to climate change and water conservation. A key element of the road map concept is the classification of recommendations according to their potential impact and implementation requirements. The classification will give council important guidance as they incorporate recommendations into their annual strategic plan.

The acceptance of this plan for dealing with sustainability issues is well timed. Under its obligations to the Climate Action Charter, the District must incorporate Green House Gas reduction targets into the District's Official Community Plan by May 2010. This community engagement process will provide an opportunity for further discussion on important issues around the District's long term sustainability. The Sustainability Task Force recommendations regarding water conservation also fit well with the next phase of the Highlands Ground Water Protection Study.

CLIMATE ACTION AND SUSTAINABILITY IN THE REGION

Communities throughout the Capital Regional District, like the District of Highlands, are looking closely at energy, emissions and long term sustainability. The CRD has created a Climate Action Program to support these community efforts in the region. The CRD Climate Action office acts as hub linking communities with resources, information and programs.

Two different groups are being coordinated by the Climate Action Program to get the dialogue going. The Intermunicipal Climate Action Steering Committee is made up of councillors from the member municipalities, while staff members from the municipalities make up a Climate Action Working Group. Councillor Dobb is currently representing Highlands on the Steering Committee. The District's planner, Jon Munn will be taking over for Laura Beckett at the working group.

One effort of the office so far has been helping municipalities understand the Community Energy and Emissions Inventories (CEEI) produced by the province. This is of particular interest to the Highlands because the CEEI is a practical tool for small communities. Highlands must establish benchmarks to meet Climate Action Charter obligations, but is of a size where doing a complete community energy and emissions inventory on its own is impractical and cost prohibitive.

Sarah Webb, the CRD Climate Action Coordinator, is currently updating a web page that will list the sustainability activities of all CRD municipalities, so they can learn from each other's experiences. She was pleased to receive a copy of the Highlands Sustainability Task Force report, and commented on its high quality. It will be posted soon as a link on the Climate Action website to be shared around the region.

PROVINCIAL PILOT PROJECT MAY INCLUDE HIGHLANDS

The Ministry of Community Development is seeking 10 local governments from around the province who have strong foundations and are now moving forward with setting targets and monitoring plans.

MILLSTREAM ROAD UPGRADE GRANT APPLICATION STATUS At its January 25th meeting, Council received a letter from Building Canada Fund – Community Components advising that the District's 2009 application for grant funding to upgrade lower Millstream Road had not been approved. Upgrading this section of road has been referred for consideration during upcoming budget discussions.

GARBAGE BLUES There is an ongoing problem with the illegal disposal of garbage on Highlands roadsides. It is unsightly and unwelcome, and affects all Highlands neighbourhoods from time to time. Staff would like residents to know that they work hard to address this issue when it arises, performing a full follow-up including clean up and attempting to track and contact those responsible.

Currently, signs are posted at the district's entrance roads indicating that a fine of up to \$10,000 could be imposed on those who leave their garbage on public property.

If you observe this type of activity, please contact the district office and be sure to pass on license numbers and other information to staff members, who will be pleased to provide assistance.

CAPITAL REGIONAL DISTRICT UPDATE

- At the CRD board meeting held January 13th, Highlands was reappointed to serve on both the Environmental Sustainability Committee (formerly known as the Environment Committee) and the Planning, Transportation, and Protective Services Committee.
- The proposed amendment to Highlands OCP that is required in order to bring our
 context statement into compliance with the provincially arbitrated decision to alter
 the Highlands Regional Urban Containment Servicing Boundary (RUCSPA) has been
 recommended for acceptance to the board, and will likely appear on the February
 CRD agenda. Once accepted by the board, the context statement will need to be
 adopted into Highlands OCP.
- The proposed bylaws recommended by a CRD subcommittee that dealt with Millstream Meadows Remediation Cost Sharing have been unanimously supported by councils throughout the region. The bylaws were created in order to increase fairness in the funding formula utilized to pay for the remediation, and would result in less cost to property owners on their tax bill, utilizing a portion of user fees from both septage disposal fees and tipping fees at the landfill. The bylaws will be voted on by the CRD board at an upcoming meeting.
- A CRD subcommittee struck to prepare for the upcoming (2012) Blue Box Recycling Program contract is examining, among other topics, methods for potential implementation of an organics component into the collection system. Diversion of food waste would reduce up to 30% of the garbage currently being land filled at Hartland, and is a potential candidate for future integration into a waste-to-energy program. Mayor Jane Mendum chairs the subcommittee and Councillor Diane Gill serves as the representative for the Western Communities.

HIGHLANDS HISTORY - DID YOU KNOW? Stewart Mountain Road is named after John Stewart (1851-1930), one of the Highland District's earliest pioneers. John came to Fort Victoria in 1853 with his parents: his father, James, was employed as a Land Steward by Kenneth McKenzie, Manager of Craigflower Farm. In the 1860s John attended Craigflower School. In 1883 he pre-empted land in the south-eastern area of the Highland District and for the next forty years John with his wife Margaret and children raised sheep and cattle. He was a well known and respected member of Highland society.
