FIRE DEPARTMENT NEWS - Having a visible ADDRESS SIGN could be a life saver! The District's fire fighters are trained as first responders. In the case of fire and medical or other 911 emergencies, response time can become critically important. Address signs should have numbers that are four inches in height in contrast colour to the

background. It is critical that numbers be readily visible from the road from all approaches as on many District roads emergency services will arrive from different directions. It's a good idea to have someone other than yourself look for your address at night...you know where to look so it may appear quite easy to you.

As of Thursday, September 3 the Fire Hazard rating has been changed to MODERATE. If the weather returns to higher temperatures the rating will return to EXTREME - please monitor the website or Highlands Fire Department facebook or twitter accounts for any changes. MODERATE rating permits campfires (no larger than .5m x .5m) in a fire pit and indoor woodstove burning. Backyard burning, incinerators, and Class A fires continue to be **CLOSED.**Fire Chief Dean Ford



HIGHLANDS RECEIVES \$30,000.00 FROM CANADA 150 INFRASTRUCTURE PROGRAM In 2013 the District began to upgrade the play area of Twinflower Park and now, with the successful application to the Canada 150 infrastructure program, our budget has effectively doubled. We will now go through a process of deciding the best way to replace the old wooden structures. This funding creates a range of opportunity that didn't exist before and council is looking forward to getting feedback from the community on how to finish the park.

2015 PROPERTY TAX PAYMENT REMINDER

For the year 2015, the tax due date was July 2. On July 3 a 5% penalty was added to all outstanding amounts including the Home Owner Grants (HOG). Reminder notices were mailed at the beginning of July to those property owners who had outstanding taxes. Please note that as of 4:00pm Tuesday September 1, 2015 an <u>additional</u> 5% penalty will be added to outstanding current (2015) taxes.

You can also *register* through our new Online Service button on our website which will give you access to your account balances 24/7. To ensure your payment is applied to your account in a timely fashion, please drop off your payment at the District Office located at 1980 Millstream Road. We accept cash, cheque or debit. After hours, cheques can be dropped in our secure mailbox at the front door (no cash please).

<u>EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS</u> is many things to many different people. At its core is a basic desire to be prepared for what may come in the event of an emergency. Where we live and our resources at hand often play into what approach we take to emergency preparedness. I would like to discuss the topic of "our surroundings".

This should start with the space around us, such as the room you are in right now, and extend to the neighbourhood in which we live in. In the event of an emergency, what would you do and how would you react? The emergency taking place could be anything from an interface fire threatening your home to a strong earthquake shaking the region. Taking a few moments to

think about how you would react and what you would need to not only survive but thrive is a good exercise to do from time to time. Extending the awareness you have for your home to your surrounding neighbourhood is the next step. Here in the Highlands we are, for the most part, a rural community. This means by its very nature the houses in the Highlands are less densely packed than those in the surrounding municipalities. Living on larger lots can be very peaceful and enjoyable but can lead to its own issues in an emergency. Being more remote and removed from the city centre means that help is often slower to respond. As such, it is important that you get to know your neighbours as in an emergency, once you have established that you are safe, being active and communicating with your neighbours can help to ensure that they are safe as well. Remember, you may need help that the resources at hand can't deal with, and knowing those around you helps extend your pool of potential help in an emergency. BE BEAR AWARE !! The District would like to remind all residents that the number one attractant to bears is household garbage, and that it is the responsibility of the home owner to ensure that household garbage is securely stored until the morning of collection day. Please consider FREEZING leftover food products until garbage collection day. The smell of meat and other food products also attracts

raccoons, which can then also attract cougars.

Other attractants include fruit trees, bird feeders and pet food. Fruit trees should be picked as the fruit ripens and ensure that windfalls do not accumulate. If you are unable to pick the fruit yourself consider a local organization like *Lifecycles which offers* a program called *The Fruit Tree Project* - information of this project may be found here: http://lifecyclesproject.ca/initiatives/fruit tree/.

Ministry of Environment statistics indicate that the vast majority of wild animals that might be relocated unfortunately end up dying usually from the trauma of the incident or possibly starvation. Please visit the following websites for more information on bear safety: wildsafebc.com OR

HERITAGE PIECE Francis Thomas Gregory left England as a young man in 1889 and spent the next ten years exploring the Canadian wilderness as a trapper and a gold seeker in the Yukon. With a nest egg from his Yukon adventures he came to Victoria to look for land to homestead. In 1900 he purchased the section around Fizzle Lake in the Highlands and finished the partially built log cabin that was on the site. By 1902 he had met and married Sybil Mitchell and brought her back to his small cabin which they called Lakelands. Frank and Sybil spent the next fifty years in that house taming the wilderness and raising three children. Frank also served as secretary of the Highland School Trustees for many years. Their little house


is still there to this day on the property on Munn Road and a replica of it serves as the caretaker residence in the Caleb Pike Heritage Park.

REZONING: ECOASIS TENNIS FACILITIES At the regular council meeting held June 1, Council approved a rezoning on a portion of the Bear Mountain property within Highlands to permit the construction of an indoor/outdoor tennis facility including a clubhouse. The proposal was for eight courts, four of which will be enclosed with a domed, soft covering structure. The clubhouse facility will include washrooms, showers, prepared foods and a sitting area.
