BYLAWS NO. 324 & 325 On June 14, Council held a public hearing for both Bylaw 324 (Greenhouse Gas Reduction) and Bylaw 325 (Regional Context Statement). Each of these bylaws amend the District's Official Community Plan. Bylaw 324 results from the provincial mandate to set targets to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, while Bylaw 325 finalizes the 2008 provincial arbitrator's decision to alter the Regional Urban Containment Servicing Policy Area (RUCSPA) by amending Highlands Regional Context Statement. The report of the public hearing can be found here: https://distriction.org/highlands.ca/minutes/council/2010/. At its June 21st meeting, Council adopted both of the bylaws.

Check your pond or wetland this month through to September. Bullfrogs may be present wherever there is year-round water.

COUNCIL SUBMISSION TO THE PROVINCIAL WATER ACT MODERNIZATION PROCESS B.C. is the only province in Canada that does not have groundwater regulation, and the 2007 State of the Environment report indicated that 35% of observation wells in the province reflected a decline in aquifer levels.

At its regular meeting May 17th, Council endorsed a submission from Groundwater Task Force chair Eric Bonham to the provincial government providing input to the proposed new Water Act. The existing Water Act was written at a time when water was considered to be in plentiful supply; due to population increases and climate change, there is now need for new approaches to resolve competing demands on a finite resource. The Highlands, being almost entirely dependent on groundwater, has an interest in how it is protected, both in quality and quantity.

The Highlands submission supports four key components identified in the provincial review: to protect stream health and aquatic environments, to improve water governance arrangements, to introduce more flexibility and efficiency in the water allocation system, and to regulate groundwater use for large withdrawals and in priority areas. Highlands Council is particularly concerned about the fourth component, and supports licensing, measurement and reporting of high-production wells in priority areas. The submission also supports a number of other objectives, listed on the municipal website on the May 17th Council agenda package.

2010 BUDGET On May 10th at a special meeting, Council passed the tax rates and five-year plan bylaws for 2010. The five-year plan includes total expected revenue from each of the funding sources described in the Community Charter (taxation, sale of services, other revenue, and grants and contributions), as well as a list of expenses for general government, protective services, transportation, planning, recreation and culture, and amortization (a new requirement because of a change in required accounting standards - all municipal capital assets now must be amortized to show depreciation).

Fees charged for permits are generally low, with the exception of building and subdivision permits which are set so their administration costs are largely recovered from permit fees. The District is looking into other fees, such as soil deposit and removal permit fees, to determine if they might be cost-recovered as well. Residential taxes account for 86% of total property taxation, with business at 8% and recreation and non-profit at 4.6%. Utilities, light industrial, private managed forest, and farmland make up the remainder.

For the 13th consecutive year, Council has not increased the municipal portion of property taxes. New lots, new construction, and completion of the Bear Mountain golf course resulted in an increase in taxes collected. Your property taxes may have increased, but mainly because other outside agencies (schools, hospitals, and transit) have increased their requisitions. Council increased Highlands contributions to CRD Arts and CRD Housing because it was felt that our contributions in the past have been minimal and far below levels from other contributing municipalities.



HIGHLANDS HISTORY - Highlanders today have mixed feelings towards our abundant deer population especially when they eat our favourite tulips. Early Highland settlers had a different attitude. Often venison was their only source of red meat as cows were kept for milk to produce butter and cheese which was sold as a way of generating income. Jessie Bernard, who lived in the little brown house still standing on Millstream Lake Road near Munn Road, kept a diary of her daily activities. Her entry of November 11, 1903 "George (her husband) and Frank (Gregory, her brother-in-law) went hunting and got a young buck in two hours, home for dinner, jolly to have lots of meat." Settlers also sold their catch in town. October 19, 1903: "(William) Rountree got a buck weighting 141 pounds." Then October 22: "Frank and Rountree drove to town together taking the former's rig and latter's horse. Frank had a happy time as Rountree got drunk, he sold his buck, 135 pounds, for 6 1/2 cents (a pound)."
