Highlands population and dwelling counts from the 2021census have been released. Our population rose from 2,225 from 2016 to 2,482, an 11.6% increase from the 2016 census (2,225) population. Our number of dwellings increased by 65 in the past five years.

The International Astronomical Union announced last month that the 9.4 km wide asteroid formerly known as 10109 will be named Sidhu in honour of Sid Sidhu. The long time Highlands resident moved here with his family for the clear and dark night skies. He is a passionate member of the Royal Astronomical Society of Canada and has inspired many Victorians, especially generations of children from grades 1-6, with his presentations and love for astronomy.

2022 Home Owner Grants

The Home Owner Grant is a property tax assistance program offered by the Province. The Province introduced legislation to enable centralization of the Home Owner Grant Program in 2021. This means that all Home Owner Grant applications must now be submitted directly to the B.C. Government online or over the phone. **Applications can no longer be accepted at the District Office.**

Eligible property owners can apply for their grants at <u>gov.bc.ca/homeownergrant</u> or by calling toll-free to 1-888-355-2700 to speak with an agent. Applications for the 2022 grants will be processed when property tax notices are issued at the end of May. If you apply early, your application will be held until taxes are levied. Residents are encouraged to wait for their tax notices to arrive before applying for the 2022 grant.



Cats and Birds

How can I make My Home and Yard Bird-Safe?

An Environment Canada study estimates that cats kill between 100 and 350 million birds each year in Canada alone. The best way to reduce this carnage is to keep your cats inside, in outdoor enclosures or on a leash with you. This is also much safer for your cat. According to the Ontario SPCA, outdoor cats have an average life expectancy of 2-5 years while indoor cats live 12.5 years, on average.

Other ways to limit your cat's ability to kill outdoors are:

- remove bird feeders that spill seeds to the ground where the birds are easy prey, and
- make your cat more visible to birds by using a bird-safe collar cover, available at some pet stores in Victoria and online. These have been shown to be 87 % effective in reducing bird catches https://www.birdsbesafe.com. Collar bells are ineffective in preventing cats from catching and killing birds.



Glass and Birds

It is estimated in Canada 16 to 42 million birds are killed or injured by collisions with windows and glass railings every year. Buildings can be designed to significantly reduce the risk of bird collisions.

The Highlands District Sustainable Land Use Select Committee is preparing a pamphlet with guidelines for new homebuilders which will be available at the District office in the coming months. Existing homeowners can reduce bird deaths with the use of decals which are available at pet stores, online and from the SPCA at https://spca.bc.ca/news/striking-bird-window-collisions/ and https://shop.spca.bc.ca/collections/wild-arc ~Allan Roger

Bear Aware?



- Remove or secure attractants.
- Do not store garbage or other organic waste outdoors.
- If you have curbside collection,

only put the containers out on the morning of collection day

- never the night before. Make sure recyclables have been cleaned.
- Pick fruit early and do not let windfall accumulate.
- Avoid feeding birds when bears are most active (April to November) and ensure birdfeeders are always inaccessible to non-target species such as squirrels and raccoons. 
